Sample Transfer Pathway

Gender, Women's, and Sexuality Studies (GWSS) is a fascinating field that explores how people understand and express their identities. It looks at topics like gender, feminism, sexuality, and social justice, which have been part of human societies for a very long time. When you study GWSS, you'll learn about different ways people see themselves and others, and how these views have changed over time and across cultures. You'll explore the history of movements for equality and understand how people have worked to make society fairer for everyone.

One of the great things about GWSS is that it goes beyond the boundaries of other disciplines. You might study how gender and sexuality innovates with things like the environment, technology, healthcare, or even video games. This wide range of topics means that what you learn in GWSS can be useful in lots of different jobs. You could use your knowledge to become a lawyer or policymaker fighting for equal rights, a doctor who understands diverse patient needs, a teacher helping students find innovative solutions to the problems of the world around us, a gender doula supporting client's empowerment, or even a leader in a company making sure everyone is treated fairly.

GWSS is all about understanding people better and working towards a world where everyone is respected and valued. You'll learn how to think critically about social issues and come up with creative solutions to problems. If you're interested in learning about different identities and want to help create positive change in the world, GWSS could be a great

choice for you. It teaches important skills like empathy, critical thinking, and communication that can be useful in almost any career you choose.

Focused on social justice and policy, this pathway goes beyond understanding change – it prepares you to actively create change. You'll develop skills in policy analysis, advocacy, and community organizing that can help address systemic inequalities. This pathway equips you with the tools to not just understand social challenges, but to develop concrete strategies for creating more just and equitable systems at local, national, and global levels.
